THE PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Welcome to the October 2017 edition of RINGO. The year is moving quickly and our next major activity is the 2RAR Association reunion and AGM to be held at Tweed Heads 27-28 October 2017. More about that a bit later.



Well done lads!

I would like to congratulate 2RAR for taking out the Duke of Gloucester Cup this year ahead of 1 and 3RAR. As well, 2RAR took out the Sir Arthur MacDonald Trophy and the Ghurkha Trophy. Soldiers from 2RAR took both first place, Cpl Liam Kiernan and second place, Pte Tom Florence in the DSM Roche CSC Memorial Cup. An outstanding outcome!

2RAR was involved in the Talisman Sabre series of exercises held in June/July. The majority of field training activities took place in Shoalwater Bay Training Area. The exercise involved over 30,000 Australian and US Defence personnel.

With effect 15 October 2017, 2RAR will be restructured as an amphibious unit and the Battalion as we know it will be radically changed. The restructure will be marked by a parade on November 23 – the 69th anniversary of the Royal Australian Regiment. The Association will be represented at that activity.

The upgrade of the 2RAR element of the Phillip Island VVAA Museum is progressing slower than planned. The project team is continuing to liaise with the curator to ensure that the upgrade is ongoing. We have set aside \$3000 for this project.

The 2RAR Association Facebook Page has gained considerable momentum and is getting considerable exposure and I encourage all members to check it regularly as we continue to post items of interest on a regular basis.

THE BATTALION REPORT

There is no rest for the ladies and gents in black. After a brief reset, post Exercise Sea Raider, 2RAR switched its focus back to Joint Land Combat. The Battalion participating in Exercise BROLGA STRIKE at High Range Training Area with the rest of the Brigade. This was a great activity, with Battle Group (BG) SAMICHON having the opportunity to conduct realistic, high tempo, combined arms training in a formation setting and with an emphasis on night operations.

It included opposed BG sized urban assaults by day and night, enabling a very high level of infantry-tank integration and the development of some innovative urban TTPs/SOPs. BROLGA STRIKE 17 also included both mounted and dismounted tasks for 2RAR. Having been so heavily invested in the development of the amphibious capability in the preceding years, it was a great for the 2RAR to show that it had lost none of its traditional strengths and could function very effectively on land in a high threat environment. Importantly, 2RAR could establish strong relationships with other units in the 3rd Bde that would prove to be a combat multiplier in future activities.

The next big event for 2RAR was the long awaited and strategically significant Exercise TALISMAN SABRE 17. Forming the majority of Ground Combat Element and Pre-Landing Force components of the three ship ANZAC Amphibious Ready Group and falling under command of the Amphibious Task Group, 2RAR force concentrated at Samichon lines with a number of other enabling capabilities, including a Combat Team (CT) from 1RAR. The Joint Amphibious Task Force then sailed south, pausing to conduct a series of mission specific wet and dry rehearsals before entering the exercise area near Stanage Bay, north of Shoalwater Bay Training Area. The Amphibious Ready Unit sized amphibious landings conducted on D Day were the culmination of the five-year amphibious trial. The landings involved the insertion of recon, snipers, and other elements of the Pre-Landing Force from amphibious shipping; over 120 nautical miles ahead of the remainder of the Task Force. Functioning as the eyes and ears of the amphibious force, the reporting the Pre-Landing Force informed planning for the amphibious assault and it enabled a detailed understanding of the battle space prior to the assault. The information they provided supported the construction of detailed target packs for pre-H Hour shaping operations. During the period of darkness immediately prior to D Day, Security platoons and reconnaissance elements from the amphibious beach team, inserted by small boat to prepare and then open the beach landing sites just prior to H Hour. Also, immediately prior to H Hour, Mortar and Direct Fire Support Weapons Platoon were inserted to further isolate the objective. On H Hour and inserting via landing craft from the CANBERRA, Alpha Company conducted a surface assault to secure the key objective close to the beach landing site. Simultaneously, Bravo Company conducted an air mobile operation off the

CANBERRA to secure a secondary objective and 108 Battery, with support from Bravo Company conducted an Artillery Raid to establish a gun line in support of the assault. Over the next 24 hours the objectives of the assault were met and the remainder of 2RAR's combat power was brought ashore.

The amphibious assault successfully demonstrated to all Australians, our allies, partner nations and any potential adversaries that the ADF now has a credible amphibious capability. It was a credit to the Bn and the other components of the Amphibious Task Force that they could work together to achieve something not seen since WW2.

Following on from the successful amphibious assault, 2RAR moved into Shoalwater Bay Training Area for the remainder of Exercise TALISMAN SABRE 17 as BG SAMICHON, one of the 3rd Brigade's key manoeuvre units. In a high tempo activity, without much respite and with a heavy emphasis for night operations, the Bn conducted a range of combined arms activities against a free-thinking enemy. Regardless of lead time and whether the task was a CT AMO, an all-night dismounted infiltration, a tactical move via PMV, and infantrytank integrated urban assault, coalition operations alongside the USMC, 2RAR got the job done. It was great for the BN to get persistent exposure to capabilities normally reserved for operations such as attack aviation, UAVs, intelligence effects and the opportunity to work alongside key coalition partners. A high point was the Bde deliberate attack on the enemy main defensive position where 2RAR was the main effort. Screened by recon and snipers, BG SAMICHON infiltrated on foot through some tough terrain during a complete period of darkness. Alpha Company then destroyed an enemy security platoon in a dug-in defensive position. This allowing Direct Fire Support Weapons Platoon to establish a support by fire location for Bravo Company and Lucky Company from the Marine Rotational Force - Darwin to conduct a flanking attack onto the enemy's depth position, catching them by surprise. Particularly noteworthy were the efforts of the Direct Fire Support Weapons platoon who carried their .50 cal machine guns and ammunition (with support from Alpha Company) for over 12kms, at night, through some demanding vegetation and terrain. External feedback on the performance of 2RAR during Exercise TALISMAN SABRE 2017 was positive and the exercise was a great way for the unit to cap off a very busy six months.

The second half of the year was supposed to be a little less hectic but the Duke of Gloucester Cup competition, commitments to key international engagement activities, the planning and conduct of specialist courses, preparations for the transition into 2RAR (Amphib) and supporting 3rd Brigade's sporting competition have kept the Battalion busy. Led by CPL Liam Kiernan, 2RAR's victorious DoG Cup team represented the Battalion incredibly well, achieving great outcomes in the face of some very strong competition from the rest of the RAR.

At the end of a demanding course, the 2RAR team was awarded the DoG Cup itself, the Macdonald Trophy as the best Section in foundation warfighting and the Ghurkha Trophy as the best Section for overall shooting. The team was placed second in the OSCMAR Trophy for best endurance. CPL Kiernan received the RSM's award as the champion section commander and he and Pte Tom Florence finished first and second respectively in the DSM Roche CSC Memorial Cup for the best individual soldier.

Especially pleasing was the fact that the team included representatives from Alpha, Bravo, and Support Company and that they carried themselves as quiet professionals throughout. An impressive effort that has enhanced the reputation of 2RAR, the efforts of our 2017 DoG Cup team reflects very well on all members of the Bn.

The professionalism, dedication, and mission focus of the Bn's junior leaders have been the hallmarks of 2RAR's success this year. This has been repeatedly reinforced, with 2RAR also winning the Bde Obstacle Course competition and 2RAR achieving a gold medal in the 3rd Brigade's International Military Skills Competition. Led by CPL Thompson-Seagraves and CPL Marc Ford respectively, both these teams came together at short notice and had limited preparation time, yet had no problems getting the job done to a high standard.

As we move into October the Battalions focus will be the continued support to B Coy who are currently completing a Rifle Company Butterworth rotation and will be due home at the start of December. They are doing extremely well with positive feedback provided from a number of external sources. A Company will complete Exercise Wantok Warrior with the Papua New Guinea Defence force from 2-30 Oct 17. The Company have worked hard to ensure they provide safe and realistic training. Support Company is focused on the conduct of the full suite of Support Company Courses to ensure the Battalion maintains a solid depth of experience going forward into the transition.

Speaking of the transition, 2RAR will transition from 3 Brigade to the 1st Division WEF 15 Oct 17. They will see 2RAR conduct the Pre-Landing Force role of the Australian Amphibious Force. We will still be an Infantry Battalion. The soldiers and NCO's have come up with some excellent ideas to ensure that the traditions and linage are maintained with the founding four rifle companies and I will explain the detail in a subsequent article. As the Battalion is currently spread to the "four winds" we will celebrate the transition with a ceremonial activity 1730 h 23 Nov 17 at Samichon Lines 'invitations in the mail'.

Overall it has been an extremely busy year with more to come. I am continually impressed with the quiet confidence and

humility displayed by our people, who are extremely deserving of the Battalions motto 'Second to None'.

AMPHIBIOUS TRANSITION

2RAR soldiers are transitioning to a leaner, more agile structure providing specialist effects for the Australian Amphibious Force.

As part of Plan Keogh, 2RAR will shift from Forces Command to come under command of HQ 1 Div/DJFHQ as a specialist amphibious infantry battalion from October 15. CO 2RAR Lt-Col Doug Pashley said the unit would restructure as a BHQ and three sub-units to generate a "pre-landing force" for the Amphibious Task Group on a "readying" and "ready" basis.

"It's an exciting time for 2RAR, building on the amphibious trial and being given the opportunity to establish a world-class amphibious unit optimised for pre-landing force operations," he said. "Working as part of a joint team, 2RAR (Amphib) will be the eyes and ears of Australia's amphibious force, specialising in the use of small boats and the conduct of reconnaissance, surveillance and sniping in a littoral ¹ environment.

"They will be aiming to provide the landing force with a detailed understanding of the environment they are about to step into. "2RAR (Amphib) will be responsible for securing beach and helicopter landing sites in support of an amphibious landing, and will be key to enabling the landing force to come ashore and complete its mission." Additionally, 2RAR will provide training support to the combat brigades as the role of the amphibious ground combat element rotates through Army. Furthermore, there will be new opportunities for the ARES to contribute.

"As a key player in the amphibious trial, 2RAR made an important contribution to the evolution of the joint amphibious capability," Lt-Col Pashley said. The restructure will see 2RAR focus on specialist amphibious skills while still retaining the ability to act as a conventional infantry battalion when required, and the reduced unit establishment allows soldiers with amphibious experience to be shared across Army. "The transition is a great opportunity to harness the total force to integrate reservists and ex-serving ARA personnel into our establishment so that we can generate both infantry and amphibious capability," Lt-Col Pashley said.

The restructure will be marked by a parade on November 23 – the 69th anniversary of the Royal Australian Regiment. "We want to use the parade to recognise the change to 2RAR but also to acknowledge the hard work and dedication that all ranks and all corps have made to develop Army's amphibious capability," Lt-Col Pashley said. ²

VALE: COLONEL ERIC HF SMITH, DSO

Colonel Eric H. Smith graduated from a two-year course at the Royal Military College, Duntroon, in December 1944, aged nineteen. He joined the 2/3rd Australian Infantry Battalion (2nd AIF) in July 1945 and was a platoon commander at Wewak. Later that year he was posted to the 4th Australian Infantry Battalion (AIF) for a short time before being posted to the 67th Australian Infantry Battalion, the predecessor of 3RAR, as one of its original members.

He served in Korea with 1RAR, become the senior instructor at the Officer Cadet School, Portsea, in 1953 and was selected to attend the Army Staff College at Camberley, UK, in 1956.

He served as a major in 1RAR and 2RAR in Malaya and in Australia in the Citizens Military Forces and in training staff positions before being tasked to raise and command 7RAR.

He was the only commanding Officer of an Australian infantry battalion in Vietnam who had had commissioned active service in World War II.

Colonel Smith was awarded Mentioned in Dispatches (MID) for his service with 1RAR in Korea and was awarded a Distinguished Service Order (DSO) for his service in Vietnam as Commanding Officer of 7RAR.

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2ND/4TH BATTALION ROYAL AUSTRALIAN REGIMENT

<u>Correction</u>: 2RAR RINGO July 2017 edition; page 8. In the extract below WO1 K.A. Hall, was recorded as RSM 2RAR instead of RSM 2/4RAR. *The source has been amended. Ed.*

During the lead up to the formation of 2/4RAR, 2RAR was commanded by LTCOL J.A. Sheldrick with RSM 2RAR being WO1 C.H. Swinbourn (1971-73).

2RAR and 4RAR were linked on the 15 August 1973 to form 2nd / 4th Battalion, The Royal Australian Regiment (2/4RAR).

The Battalion was formed up on the 4RAR parade ground by RSM WO1 W.T.C. (Wally) Thompson. Members leaving the Battalion for other postings fell out and marched off the parade. WO1 Thompson marched the remaining soldiers to 2RAR's parade ground and handed them over to WO1 K.A. Hall, RSM 2/4RAR (1973-75).

ROYAL ULSTER RIFLES TROPHY

History of Design

The sterling silver dish forming the main part of the RUR Trophy is called an Armada dish, and is a replica of a piece of an original service of silver made over 350 years ago. Silver taken from the Spanish Armada was used to make a Banqueting service for Sir Christopher Harris in the reign of Elizabeth I.

The original service was of 22 dishes of varying sizes, bearing the arms of Sir Christopher Harris and the London Hall-marks for the years 1581, 1599, 1600 and 1601. During the civil war, about the year 1645, the service was buried on Dartmoor in order to avoid seizure by the Parliamentary troops as the owner at that period (a great-nephew of the original owner) held a command in the Royal Forces at Plymouth. The service was discovered early in the present century when a workman put his pick through one of the dishes.

This interesting and attractive piece of silver has been faithfully reproduced from the original, even to the characteristically staggered hall-marks. It has many uses and its story is a link with the common history of all the English-speaking peoples.

PROUD HISTORY OF 2RAR

THE 2nd Battalion, Royal Australian Regiment, was first formed as the Australian 66th Battalion in 1945. It has deployed to some of Australia's most significant engagements, including the Occupation of Japan, the Korean War, the Malayan Emergency, and the Vietnam War. As part of the post-Vietnam War reduction of the Australian Army, 2RAR was combined with 4RAR between August 15, 1973 and February 1, 1995 as the 2nd/4th Battalion, Royal Australian Regiment.

In more recent times, the battalion has participated in operations in Rwanda, East Timor (Timor-Leste) and the Solomon Islands. It contributed rifle companies to the security force protecting the Australian Embassy in Baghdad, following the 2003 invasion of Iraq. In May 2006, 2RAR's headquarters, support company and a rifle company deployed to Iraq as part of the third rotation of the Al Muthanna Task Group.

From September 2007 to May 2008, elements of the battalion deployed to Afghanistan on Operation Slipper. The Combat Team conducted five major operations during its deployment, expanding the ISAF and ANSF's permanent influence in the Chora Valley and into the Baluchi Pass.

I am very pleased to be asked to write the Foreword to this reprinting of the 2RAR's tour in South Vietnam from May 1967 to June 1968. The fact that this valuable record of operational service is being re-printed demonstrates the continuous and growing interest in 2RAR's contribution to the Army and to the nation by members of the battalion both passed and present.

The recent un-linking of 2RAR from 4RAR has focussed attention on the battalion's service and it is fitting that this reprinting coincides with the fiftieth anniversary of the raising of 2RAR's parent unit the 66 Australian Infantry Battalion, at Labuan in October 1945.

As one of the three original battalions of the Royal Australian Regiment, 2RAR has a long and distinguished record of operational service in Korea, Malaya and South Vietnam. This book tells the story of the Battalion's first tour in South Vietnam, when with the addition of two companies of New Zealand infantrymen, 2RAR/NZ (ANZAC) took part in twenty three operations in Phuoc Tuy and Bien Hoa Provinces. During this time the battalion together with the remainder of the Australian Task Force had to withstand the full weight of the Tet offensive, which it did successfully. By June 1968 the battalion had an enviable operational record and had contributed significantly to stabilising the situation in Phoc Tuy Province.

This book tells the story of courage and professionalism by an Australian battalion at war, together with the lighter aspects of operational service which are always well remembered by those who took part in them.

I commend the battalion's initiative in arranging the re-printing, knowing that it will prove of interest to a wide readership, but particularly to the present and future members of 2RAR.

SILVER SOLDIER WENT TO WAR

In David Hatton's time as RSM 2RAR (2006-08), Jimmy Ringo was simply referred to as the Silver Soldier and was located in the Officers Mess. The Keeper of the Silver Soldier was the responsibility of the Senior Subbie (LT) - under close supervision of the ADJT.

Background to the Silver Soldiers Operational Deployment to Iraq.

Again, the operational redeployment of the Silver Soldier was the sole responsibility of the ADJT. And the Silver Soldiers new home became the CO's "Donga" / Office - some 15 meters from the Battle Group Command Post with the RSM residing on top of the CO's donga / office in one of his own.

The CO - LTCOL Mick Mahy named the new Camp - Camp Terendak recognising 2RARs second tour of Malaya when it joined the 28th Brigade again, this time at Camp Terendak



In 2006 the 2nd Bn led the Al Muthanna Task Group 3 (AMTG No 3) .

This was a battlegroup (Bn size) that formed Australia's main ground force contribution to the Multinational force in Iraq. Located at Camp Smitty in Al Muthanna.

The Silver Solider deployed on Operations to Iraq as part of AMTG 3. The ADJT - (or referred to as the Battle Captain) at the time (Capt Mick Bassingthwaite) who later commanded the Bn. The ADJT was tasked by the then CO - LTCOL Mick Mahy to ensure the Silver Solider was ready to deploy and arrive safety in country, and was to be then located in the CO's Bunker / Office.

The AMTG was made up of around 450 personnel and consisted of:

Task Group Headquarters - 2RAR a cavalry squadron - 2/14QMI an infantry company - 2RAR support company - 2RAR

a training team (on 6-month deployments)- predominately 2RAR combat service supporting (CSS) elements - 2RAR Admin company, 6RAR platoon, 3 Brigade and 1 Div specialists

The AMTG was established in April 2005 and ceased to exist in July 2006 when the 2RAR led Australian force was relocated to Dhi Qar Governorate and changed its name and role as Overwatch Battle Group (West).

The Overwatch Battle Group (West) was an Australian Army battlegroup that represented Australia's largest contribution to the Multinational force in Iraq. The Battle Group was established in July 2006 and was based at Tallil Airbase in Dhi Qar Governorate. Upon its formation Overwatch Battle Group (West) consisted of units which were previously assigned to the third, and final, rotation of the Al Muthanna Task Group, following the handover of Camp Smitty to Iraqi Forces in July 2006.

The Battle Group formed part of Multi-National Division (South-East). An additional 38 personnel and four Bushmaster protected mobility vehicles were deployed in late 2006 to increase the size of the force to over 500 soldiers supported by 40 ASLAVs and 19 Bushmasters.

The Camp the Overwatch Battle Group occupied was first established by the CSS Company elements, and occupied by the remainder of the Battle Group after a tactical withdrawal and relocation of the remainder of the Battle Group from Camp Smitty.

near Malacca in October 1961.

Total Australian strength in southern Iraq rose to over 500 personnel.

Overwatch Battle Group (West)'s main role was to provide support to Iraqi Security Forces in a crisis if requested by the Iraqi Government and the Multi-National Force – Iraq. Whilst it was never called upon to act in this role, the Battle Group did conduct combat and security operations within the cities of An Nasiriyah and As Samawah, the provincial capitals of Dhi Qar and Al Muthana respectively, extensive patrolling within rural areas and on Main Supply Routes (MSRs) to counter the indirect fire and improvised explosive device threat, training and mentoring of the Iraqi Army and Police, support to strike operations undertaken by United States Special Forces, and construction and re-construction work. The Battle Group's training team was responsible for providing basic training to Iraqi Army personnel at the Basic Training Centre in Tallil.

During our rotation of the deployment, the battle group took part in a number of engagements, including the Battle of Al Rumaythah, which occurred on 26 September 2006.

Prelude

At 09:00 on 26 September 2006 a force consisting of a 60-man element from OBG(W) arrived at the Iraqi Army barracks in AI Rumaythah to conduct a meeting with local stakeholders and to co-ordinate the training of Iraqi police and the reconstruction of the barracks itself. The group comprised infantry from 2RAR mounted in Bushmaster PMVs and cavalry from 2/14 LHR (QMI) mounted in ASLAVs, and was under the command of Major Andrew Stevens. In 2006 AI Rumaythah was a city of 75,000 people and had a reputation for violence and given the threat the Australians deployed snipers in overwatch positions around the barracks, as well as an infantry platoon. Nearby two cavalry ready-reaction groups were on standby, in addition to the Battle Group 2RAR led HQ Tac.

The Battle

As the meeting commenced small groups of armed men were observed conducting surveillance of the Australian positions. During the next hour insurgents gathered throughout the town and soon after 1100 a rocket-propelled grenade was fired. The insurgents were moving in small groups through the town and appeared to be trying to encircle the barracks in order to conduct a deliberate assault and destroy the Australian force. For the next hour the barracks were attacked with grenades and small arms fire from ranges between 200 metres to 300 metres.

In response snipers engaged the insurgents whilst the platoon to the west of the barracks held its ground. Support from USAF F-16s was requested and they were used to fly low and fast over the insurgents in an attempt to distract them.

Covered by the Combat Team (A Company) party subsequently left the barracks in Bushmasters, still under heavy fire. Although attempting to prevent the withdrawal the insurgents failed to flank the barracks to the north and south and by 12:15 the Force had successfully broken contact and left Al Rumaythah.

During the fighting the Battle Group used the standard suite of infantry weapons including the F-88 Austeyr and F-89 Minimi LSW, well as MAG-58 MGs and sniper rifles. The ASLAV and Bushmaster vehicles played a crucial role in protecting the soldiers and allowing them to break contact safely. Indirect fires and Close Air Support had been available during the contact, however the decision was made not to escalate the situation due to the proximity of civilians. The soldiers had withdrawn in a disciplined manner and had put themselves at considerable risk to ensure the safety of civilians, whilst applying their fire in a careful and controlled manner.

The Aftermath

The Australians suffered no casualties, while insurgent casualties were difficult to determine. A number of insurgents were observed to have been hit by Australian fire, and at least one source claims that five were killed. Up to 30 insurgents were believed to have been involved in the battle, however their identity—for example whether they were Sunnis or Shia religious groups, or al-Qaida—was unable to be determined. The balaclava-clad insurgents were dressed mainly in black and armed with AK-47s and grenade launchers. Regardless, they were said to have fought in a well-coordinated manner and had used considerable firepower against the Australians. After the battle, it was claimed that the insurgents had used civilians as a shield from Australian fire. Despite this there were no reports of civilian casualties after the incident. Two of the Australian infantry section commanders were later awarded the Distinguished Service Medal for coordinating a successful fighting withdrawal over 250 metres of open ground.

Regimental Sergeant Major Trent Morris
